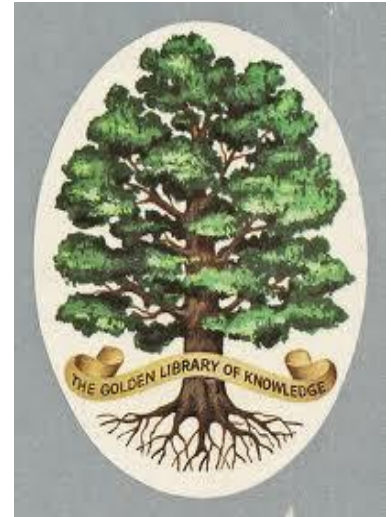
Visits to the library of life provide admirable glimpses of our ancestors and this book will take you there to meet those you never knew but whom we owe an endless debt of appreciation.

FOREWORD

Connecting the Lines of love through the generations has been a very enlightening and heart-warming experience for me. I asked myself in 2005 “*Who were my ancestors - those souls who endured so much making my life possible?*” That question led me to look into the fading memories of the past and the discovery of the conscientious ancestors who preceded us – the foundation of our **Lyons - Scalf** family!

In the *Table of Contents*, follow the color coded names for my direct family history line. The first pages are a general overview of where my grandparents lived in the Bunker Hill community of Sullivan County, Tennessee. **James Andrew “Jim” & Mary Lydia Scalf-Lyons** lives were entwined with love, joy and hard work as they raised six devoted daughters and welcomed nineteen grandchildren and several great-grandchildren before their deaths. Adding to their legacy, in 2013 there is a total of 18 great-grandchildren and 15 great-great grandchildren.

As a child, I recall my mother, **Susie Lyons-Winebarger**, telling me that we were related to almost everyone in the Bunker Hill, Chinquapin Grove and Walnut Grove communities. I remember so clearly sitting on the front porch with my grandparents and Mom as they explained how others were connected to us and I wanted to know more even then. Collecting information from relatives regarding our ancestors and current generations afforded me an opportunity to as accurately as was possible record our growing family tree.

I was blessed to have spent a great deal of time on the farm with my affectionate grandparents **Jim & Mary Scalf-Lyons** meeting many extended relatives and neighbors over the years. My grandparents, mother and aunts spoke so fondly of their relatives and people in the community that I felt as if I knew them whether we had met or not. From their memories stories, I learned of special relatives who had passed but remained vividly alive in their hearts. I’ve met many distant relatives wishing to share their branch so our family history which has grown into a much larger volume than I first conceived.

I found great joy in the time spent sharing warm memories and delightful stories about relatives, rummaging through old photographs and treasured momentos, researching public records, documents, maps, Bibles and books along with receiving valued assistance from fellow historians. Included in this book is our **Lyon(s)** history back to the first arrival in America in the early 1600’s, back to the the mid-1500’s for our **Scalf** family, the 1700’s for the **Woods** family, our **Glover** ancestors to the mid-1700’s and the **Hicks’** family from 1214. In the future, I will share as a small volume my research which spans the **Lyon(s)** family prior to their role at the Battle of Hastings titled “**Lyon & Stewart Ancestors in Europe**”.

Our family website and *Facebook* page remain active and await your input. My efforts over the years to collect pictures of as many generations as possible has resulted in a collection of hundreds used with permission and available in private, online family photograph albums.

CHAPTER I: Family Overview

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James Andrew Lyons & Mary Lydia Scalf-Lyons



LYON(S) SURNAME



SCOTLAND

Lyon

Lyon is quite distinct from the Scottish name "**Lyon**" which is our original family name so confusion can be seen in connection with these names. The surname of **Lyon** is one of the most noteworthy Scottish surnames. In Scotland, hereditary surnames were adopted according to fairly general rules and during the late Middle Ages, names that were derived from localities became widespread. The **Lyon** family originally lived in the Norman settlement of *Lyons-la-Foret* in France before migrating to Scotland. **Lyon** were first found in Norfolk, England where they were seated from very early times and were granted lands by Duke William of Normandy, their liege Lord, for their distinguished assistance in the *Battle of Hastings* in 1066 A. D.

SCALF - SCARFFE SURNAME

The name of our earliest ancestors were tracked to **Edward Scarffe/Scarffe** who was born about 1619 in Malew, Isle of Man, England and died in North Carolina earlier his father **John Scarffe/Scarffe** born October 8, 1858 St. Jamesbury Sant Edmonds, Suffolk, England. In the later part of the first millennium AD colonists **from Ireland settled in Mann**. Manx, a Goidelic language, provides the main evidence of this; earlier evidence suggests that a Brythonic-speaking people lived there. One big historical argument addresses whether the present Manx language survived from pre-Norse days, or whether it reflects a linguistic reintroduction after the Norse invasion. **Manx** (*Gaelg* or *Gailck*, pronounced [gilk] or [gilg]), also known as **Manx Gaelic** is spoken in the Isle of Man.

MALEW



Description in 1842

"Man is an island of Great Britain, in the Irish Sea, about 30 miles in length, and from 8 to 15 in breadth. It is very hilly, and one of its heights exceeds 2,000 feet. It has mines of lead, iron and copper, and quarries of building stone and slate. The soil varies in different tracts, yet produces more corn than is sufficient to maintain the natives. The air, which is sharp and cold in winter, is healthy, and the inhabitants live to a very great age. The commodities of this island are small black cattle and horses, wool, fine and coarse linen, hides, skins, honey, tallow, and herrings. About the rocks of the island breeds an incredible number of all sorts of sea-fowl, and especially on the Calf of Man, a small island not far from its most southerly point. The language is a dialect of Erse. In its civil government, which is peculiar to it, the island is divided into six shreadings, each having its proper coroner, who is entrusted with the peace of his district, and acts in the nature of a sheriff. The House of Keys is its elective legislature, &c. Castle Town is its chief place. Population 47,975."

The Parish is dedicated to St Lua, Malew, probably once the most important parish as it includes Castle Rushen and the erstwhile Island capital Castletown and the remains of the once great Rushen Abbey.

SUFFOLK

is on the eastern side of the country, characterized by low-lying, rich fertile soils of chalky boulder clay. The county is noted for its wide open skies and many of the fine 'wool churches' were funded from the agricultural wealth. Most of Suffolk lies less than 100m above sea level, with the higher ground in the west. The region is almost devoid of rock and stone, being largely clay and sand. There are a number of Bronze Age burial mounds that have survived the plough.



FAMILY GENERATIONS TERMINOLOGY

A **cousin** is a relative with whom a person shares one or more common ancestors. In the general sense, cousins are two or more generations away from any common ancestor, thus distinguishing a cousin from an ancestor, descendant, sibling, aunt, uncle, niece, or nephew.

The terms "first cousins", "second cousins", "third cousins", describe the "degree" of the cousin relationship. The degree of two cousins' relationship is determined by the number of generations to their closest common ancestor. When the cousins are not the same generation, they are described as "removed" (*example: your parent's first cousin is your first cousin once removed*). In this case, the smaller number of generations to the common ancestor is used to determine the degree, and the difference in generations determines the number of times removed. Note that the ages of the cousins are irrelevant to the definition of the cousin relationship.

- FIRST COUSIN:** non-siblings who share the same grandparents in common
- SECOND COUSIN:** non-first cousins who share great-grandparents in common
- THIRD COUSIN:** non-second cousins who share great-great-grandparents in common

- FIRST COUSINS ONCE REMOVED:** Two people for whom a first cousin relationship is one generation removed.
- FIRST COUSINS TWICE REMOVED:** Two people for whom a first cousin relationship is two generations removed.
- SECOND COUSINS ONCE REMOVED:** Two people for whom a second cousin relationship is one generation removed

A cousin chart is helpful in identifying the degree of cousin relationship between two people using their most recent common ancestor as the reference point. Cousinship between two people can be specifically described in degrees and removals by determining how close, generationally, the common ancestor is to each person.

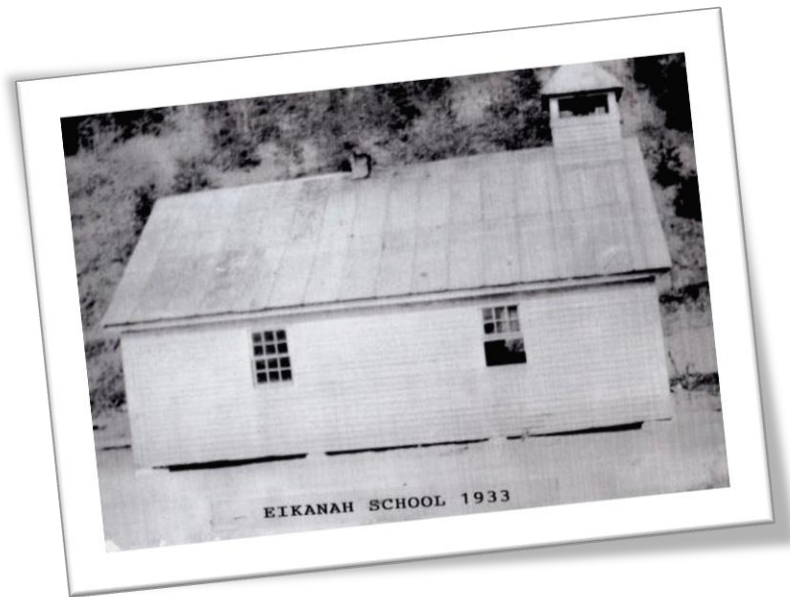

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HISTORY OF ELKANAH SCHOOL



The first educational step for **Jim & Mary Scalf-Lyons** six daughters - **Ruby, Anna B., Burlen, Susie, Ellie** and **Mary Lee Lyons** - began at Elkanah School where they recalled wonderful times spent with friends and teachers.

In 1890, the school was erected on Indian Creek Road near the old Elkanah Train Station & Post Office at the Carter Co. and Sullivan Co., Tennessee line. The location is separated by the ridgeline of Holston Mountain located in the Cherokee National Forest near the Sullivan County, Tennessee line so the school served students residing in both counties. The school had a vestibule inside the front door, it had a single room divided into two classrooms but heated by one wood stove at the front of the classrooms so the two rooms were not completely closed off to one another. Younger children were placed in one room and older students in the second room. Children brought their lunch and used at Out House as there was no indoor plumbing.

According to the *Teacher's Annual Property Report* which was prepared by the Principal, the original frame building was one room measuring 20 x 24 ft. totaling 600 square feet with 25 single desks in a building valued at \$200 and the grounds valued at \$25. The 1936 *Teacher's Annual Property Report* states the building was enlarged at some point to two rooms that were 20 x 24 ft. each doubling the size of the school. In 1936, the school contained 50 single desks, 15 double desks, had a building value of \$1,800, grounds value of \$150 and equipment value of \$150 along with the use of a circulating library of approximately 100 books. The school opened each morning with Chapel then followed the teaching of arithmetic, reading, language, spelling, writing, deportment, citizenship, health, geography, history, physical education and drawing. Student immunizations were provided here through the Carter Co. Health Dept.

The Elkanah School, train line, weigh & passenger station and post office were named after Elkanah Carr (*see page 384*) who donated the 1¼ acres of land needed for the facility. Mr. Carr was born in 1829 in North Carolina and married Margaret Feathers-Carr. Mr. Carr moved from North Carolina to Blountville to the Turkeytown community of Elizabethton according to the 1880 Census and later purchased the property where the school would be erected on Indian Creek Road off of Bunker Hill Road. Near the school, was Joe Woods community store and the V & SW's Elkanah Railroad Station all situated five miles north of Elizabethton. The post office operated 1897-1902 and the passenger train service stopped sometime between 1940 and 1942.

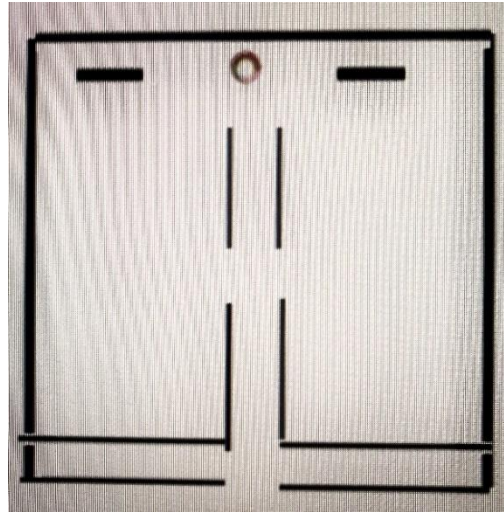
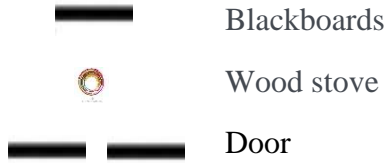
The Carter County School System during the 1949-1950 school year closed Elkanah School with students sent to Keenburg Elementary School and the Sullivan Co. students to *Chinquapin Grove School. At that time, the property returned to the ownership of an heir of Elkanah Carr via Geter Carr who paid the school system for the school building. For a while, the former Elkanah School building was used for church services and, for a short time, it served as a movie theater. Geter Carr sold the school building which was dismantled and the materials were used to build the Mountain View Baptist Church in the Bullock's Hollow community of Sullivan County, Tennessee. A few years later, Geter Carr's son, Don Lee "Bud" Carr, and daughter-in-law, Geraldine Carr, tore the school down and built a house on the Carr property on Indian Creek Road. At the dead end of Indian Creek Rd. off of Bunker Hill Rd., the school was at the turn around circle.

The Carr property where the Elkanah School originally stood was purchased for the road expansion project of Hwy. 19E in 1987-1989. The project took the Carr's house but 19E does not pass over the site where the Elkanah School building was located. The school site was located off Hwy. 19E at the end of Indian Creek Road in the clearing after the cul-de-sac. It also served as a location for school plays and church revivals.

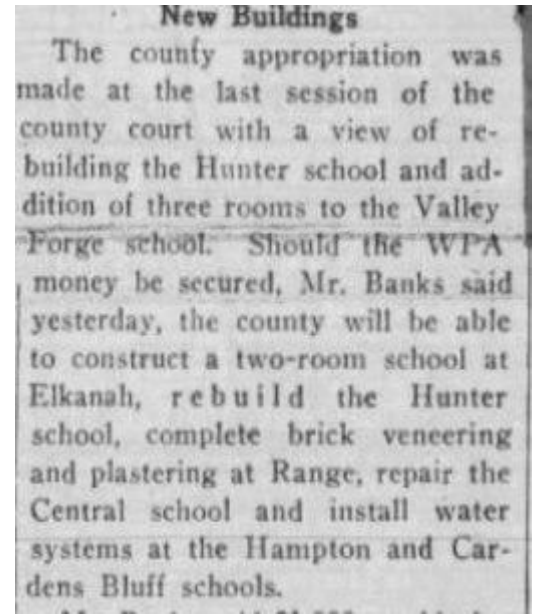
“Howard Hayes taught at Elkanah School and carried the 1933 picture of the school in his wallet. He was also a minister at Gap Creek Christian Church for a while, ‘ shared Marlene Carr, January 2011. “I go to church there and his picture is on the wall,” Upon his death in October 2005, the 1933 picture of the school passed to the Carr-Perry family.

After their introductory years at Elkanah School, students were sent to Bluff City Middle School and High School.

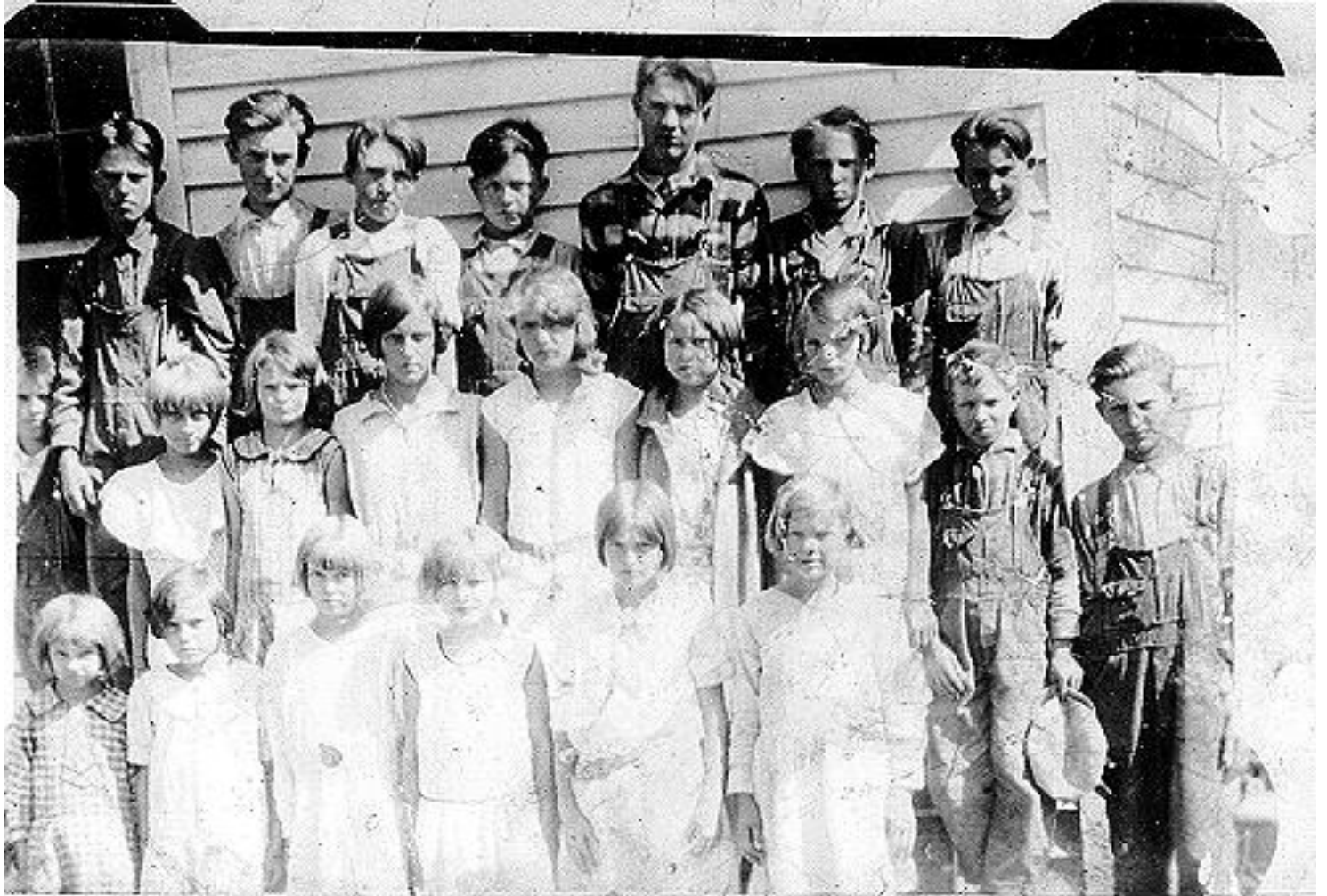

BUNKER HILL CHRISTIAN CHURCH

The *Bunker Hill Christian Church* has been attended for many generations by our Lyons, Scalf, Woods, Sams, Malone, Carr, Shipley & Perry family members. The church is located at 490 Bunker Hill Road, Bluff City, Sullivan Co., Tennessee adjacent to the Cherokee National Forest.

The history of the Bunker Hill Christian Church is long, beginning in 1889 in Walnut Grove. It continued to meet in a one-room school house until the fall of 1892, when the congregation moved to the newly-built Elkanah School, and remained there until 1911. It was then decided that a new church building needed to be constructed. Completion of the new structure was in 1911 on a hilltop in southeast Sullivan county, Tennessee, near present-day Bluff City. As the years went by, the congregation grew too large for the old building, so a larger facility at the foot of the hill was constructed in the mid-1960's. This serves as the present day fellowship hall with classrooms in the basement. A new worship facility was constructed in 2001.

CHURCH HISTORY

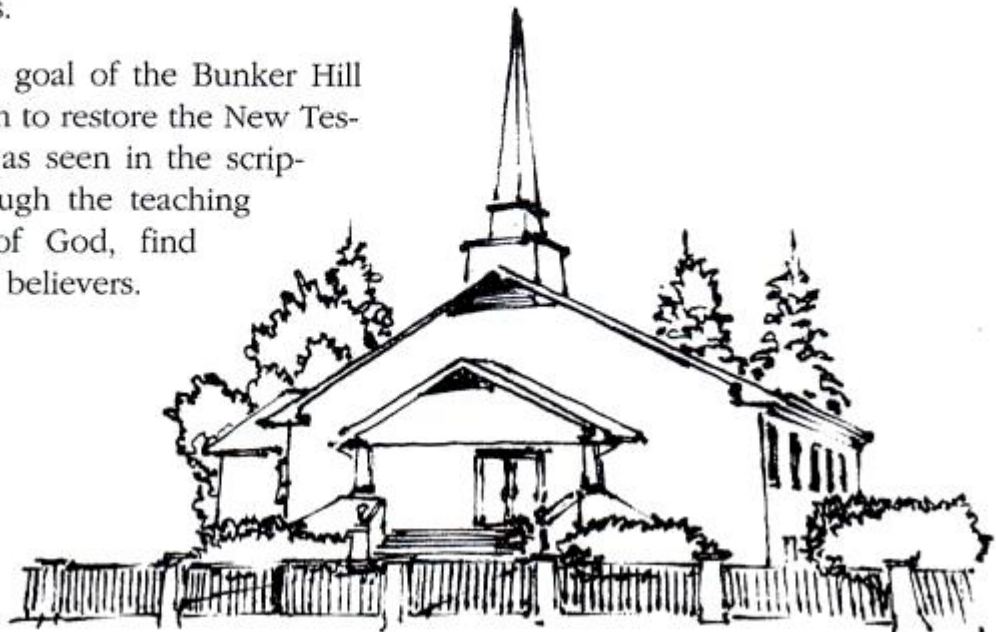
The citizens of Walnut Grove met on Sunday, June 2, 1889 for the purpose of organizing a union Sunday School. The second meeting began June 9, 1889. They continued to meet at Walnut Grove in an old one room school through September 11, 1892.

Late in the year of 1892 the congregation moved from Walnut Grove to the newly constructed Elkanah School. They worshipped at the school until 1911. As the congregation grew, the need for another place of worship became evident. In 1911, a new building for worship was completed.

During the years that followed, the congregation had its rewards and its share of hardships. Late in the year of 1959, a revival held by John Hall, gave great spirit to the church. The need for a larger building was evident and ground-breaking for the new building was held on April 29, 1961. This construction was made possible by the dedicated members giving of their time and talents.

It has been the goal of the Bunker Hill Christian Church to restore the New Testament Church as seen in the scriptures, and through the teaching of the word of God, find unity with all believers.

The Bible is our authority and our only rule of faith and practice.

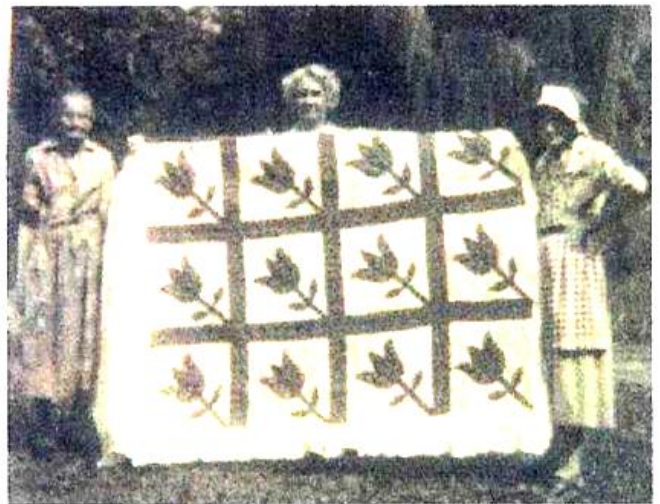
“Bunker Hill Christian Church always had a program on Christmas Eve. Now, Santa always came while we were at church. The older I became the more suspicious I became of my Dad (McKinley “Ken” Scalf). The children of the church always presented a play and all of us were in it. I can remember watching my Dad like a hawk since Mom (Alma Walker-Scalf) couldn't drive. I'd peek through the stage curtain and watch our car to make sure it didn't move. In other words, I kept a close eye on my Dad. 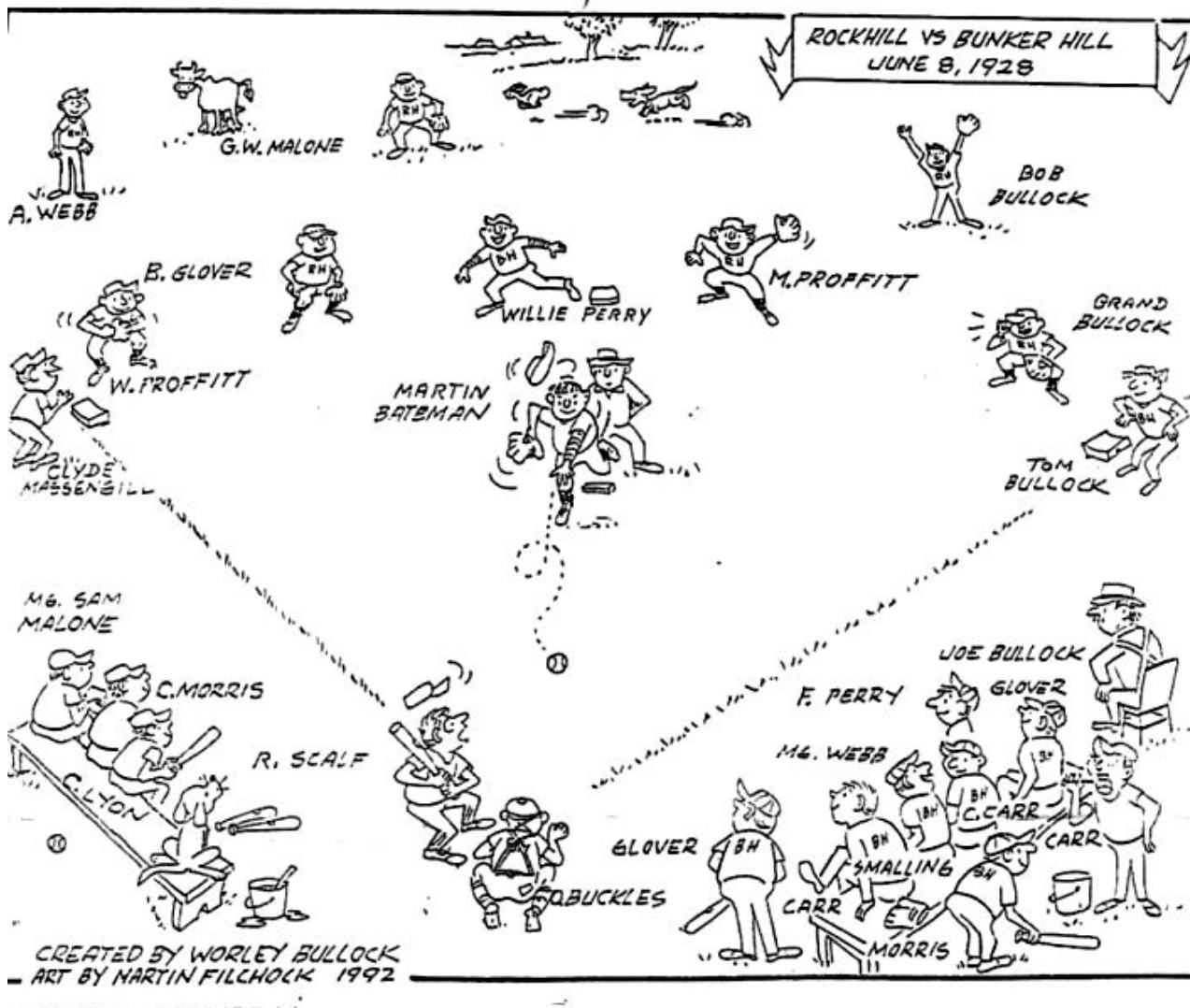

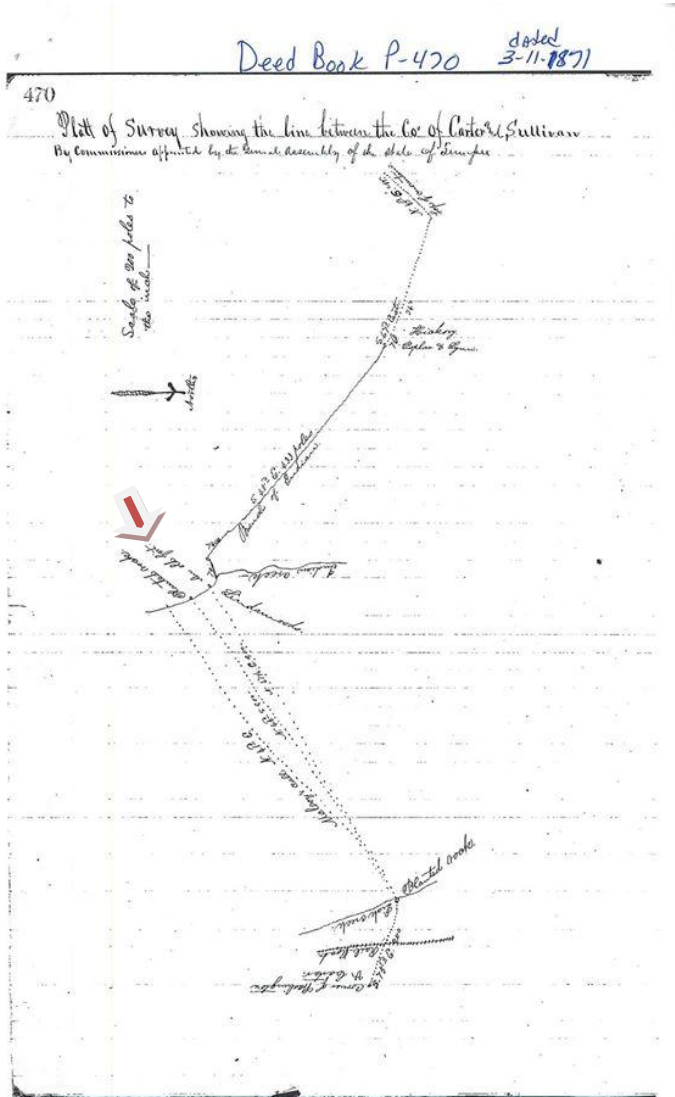
“This ball field (*pictured on the right*) was on the hill above Sam and Nannie Scalf-Perry's home.

I was very young maybe 1957 or later when they played there. This was before the new paved Bunker Hill Road was built. The hill shown is on the right is side of Uncle Jim and Aunt Duck (*James Andrew “Jim” Lyons & Mary Lydia Scalf-Lyons*) house facing the road. Actually, it came very near the side of the house. The next field was where the present church parsonage is across from the church. The last ball field was at the corner of Woods Road and Bunker Hill Road,” explained Charlene Scalf-Miller,
May 16, 2014.



BUNKER HILL COMMUNITY

The Bunker Hill community is located in Sullivan County, Tennessee bordering Carter County at the foot of the ridge of the Holston Mountains and Cherokee National Forest. It is near Bluff City which had a number of name changes during the Civil War. The names for Bluff City (including merged communities) have included Choate's Ford, Middletown, Union-Union Depot, Zollicoffer and, finally, Bluff City in 1887 which is the same year of its incorporation as a city.



- Designates the location of Bunker Hill Christian Church

The Bunker Hill community was named for a **Civil War Fort** located at the site of the first Bunker Hill Christian Church up on the hill behind the current church. “On the backside of the fort is the name Lindamoods. There was a Lindamoods Mill at that location at one time,” shared Lori Morrell who also shared the Carter Co., TN land plat case left (see red arrow) showing the location of “The Old Fort”.

“Molly Carr-Perry my grandmother told us there was once a coffin making company in Bunker Hill on Woods Road. It was located where Earl (Bud) and Phyllis Maines have their home. There is a small hill behind their house. Grandma Perry also said that my Great Grandfather Jeff Morris bought the last coffin made there for my Great-grandmother, Emma Sams- Morris,” shared Charlene Scalf-Miller, May 1, 2016.

First Hyatt Store on Bunker Hill Road

It was built in 1959 near the road by Claude & Cordie Hyatt. This store was torn down and a second one was set back from the road further near the second Bunker Hill Christian Church that was being built. The second store was operated by their son, Bob Hyatt & wife Alice (see page 231).

Ghost Railroads of Tennessee

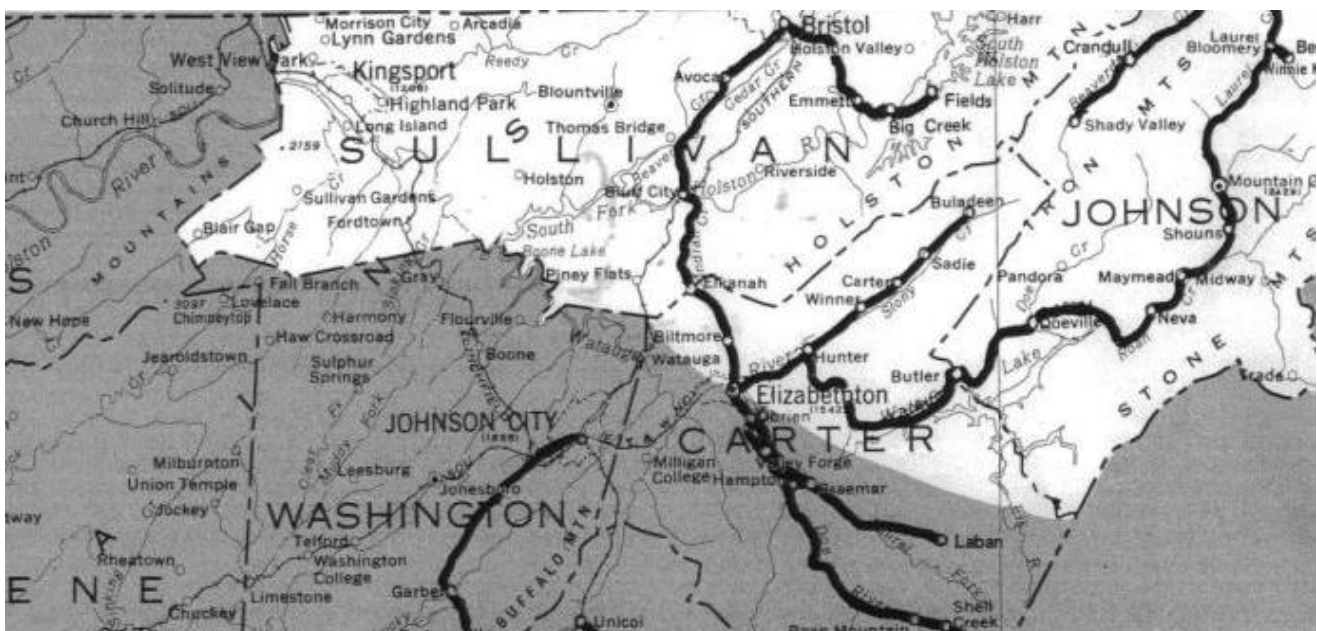

A portion of a map from the book “*Ghost Railroads of Tennessee*” by Elmer Sulzer is shown below which denotes by a heavy black line the main route of the **Elkanah Railroad Line** in Sullivan-Carter Counties owned by Virginia & Southwestern Railroad (V & SW). On the map, find the broken line in the white section labeled “HOLSTON MTN.” and you will see “Elkanah” designating the community & railroad line just before the “H” in Holston. The V & SW Railroad tracks ran from Watauga through Piney Flats in Sullivan Co. and as it came out of Bluff City it became known as the Elkanah Railroad Line stopping at the Elkanah Train Station-Post Office then continued on to the Keenburg community, Biltmore community and into the City of Elizabethton. The trains on this line carried passengers and freight. **Susie Lyons-Winebarger**, daughter of **Jim & Mary Scalf-Lyons**, recalled many shopping trips to Elizabethton riding on the passenger train leaving from the Elkanah Station on Indian Creek Road.

A railroad spur line not shown on this map ran off the main Elkanah Railroad line from Indian Creek Road passing through the Bunker Hill community. Will Walker (*father of Alma Walker Scalf, the wife of McKinley “Ken” Scalf*) utilized this Elkanah Railroad spur to transport his lumber according to his granddaughter Connie Scalf-Mauk. Connie explained that when he was young her father, Ken Scalf, used to log for her grandfather, Will Walker, and she remembers finding the old spikes and rails along the abandoned railroad spur’s route as a child. Walker is recorded as residing on this farm in the 1910 & 1920 Census records with the land laying in both Sullivan & Carter Counties. **Jim & Mary Scalf-Lyons** purchased a large portion of the Walker farm sometime in the late 1920s and remained there until their deaths in 1971. George & Lula Scalf (sister of Mary Scalf Lyons) purchased the remainder of the Walker farm.

The Elkanah Railroad line spur split off from the main line around what is today the Indian Creek and Bunker Hill Roads intersection where there was a railroad bridge trestle. Travelling northeast up Bunker Hill Rd. the tracks of the railroad line spur ran parallel along the far side of the creek on the right side of the road hugging the bottom of the hillside. It continued behind the Vestal Carr home (*two homes before the Lyons family*) then traveled over the creek and ran beside Bunker Hill Road on the right side of the road in front of the Lyons family farm up to Big Arm Rd. where it took a right and crossed a trestle at the creek then ended at the Interstate Lime Corporation. Carrie Bullock Carr (*wife of Tom Carr*) remembered the railroad route clearly stating that “a small train ran to the lime kiln and picked up logs and lumber from farms along the way”.

Passenger service on the Elkanah Railroad line was discontinued in 1936 and the entire 46-mile track from Bluff City to Mountain City was abandoned in September 10, 1940.

Passengers were not neglected in the early days of the Virginia & Southwestern, a timetable dated November 11, 1906, showing two round trips daily (one daily except Sundays) on the Tennessee Division.

Numbers 5 and 6 ran daily; 18 and 19 daily except Sundays. Telegraph stations were located at Bristol, Bluff City, Elizabethton, Butler, Maymead, and Mountain City.

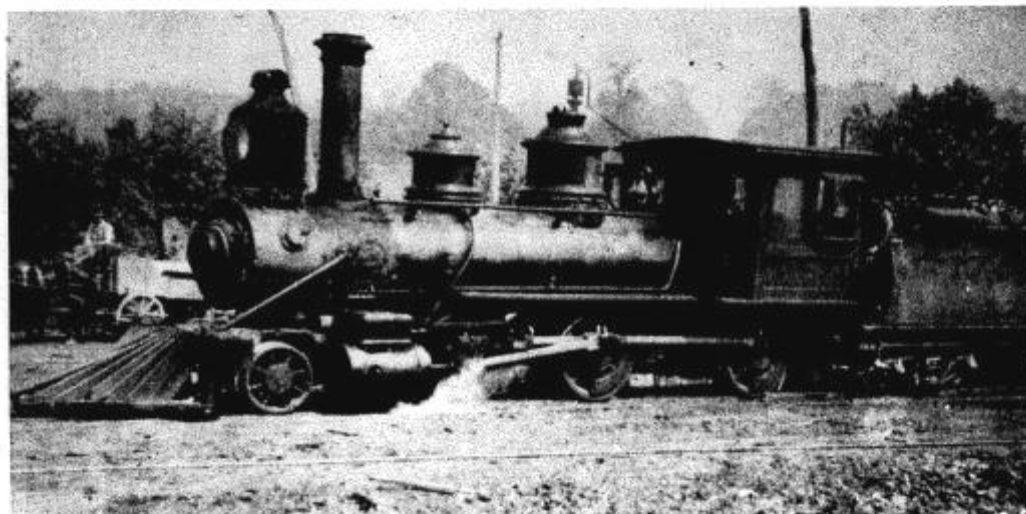
On May 17, 1932, the Virginia & Southwestern Railway Company (owner) and the Southern Railway Company (lessee) applied to the Interstate Commerce Commission to abandon the 10.59 mile Buladeen (Stony Creek) Branch. Traffic had dwindled from a total of 709 carloads in 1927 to 87 carloads in 1931. Deficits were reported for the past five years. The requested permission was granted September 22, 1932, effective 30 days later.

The Bristol-Mountain City segment remained intact for nine more years. Then on July 7, 1939, the V&SW and Southern jointly applied to the ICC for permission to abandon the 11.9 miles of track between Bristol and Bluff City, owing to the fact that the Southern's main Bristol-Knoxville line ran between these points and the duplicate trackage seemed unnecessary. Permission was granted in September of the same year, subject to the usual 30-day delay.

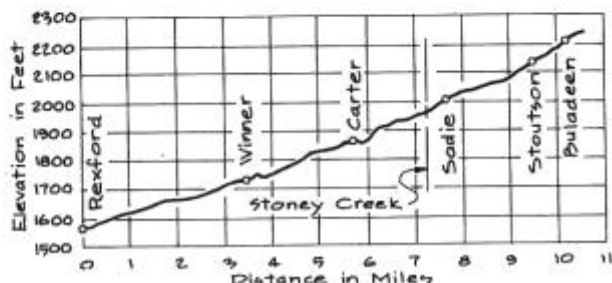

With the evaporation of the mining communities on Stony Creek, the Bristol-Buladeen trains were discontinued. The daily round trips between Bristol and Mountain City evolved into mixed train service. Then in 1936 all passenger service on the segment was discontinued. A lone freight train remained to plod its way along the line three times a week.

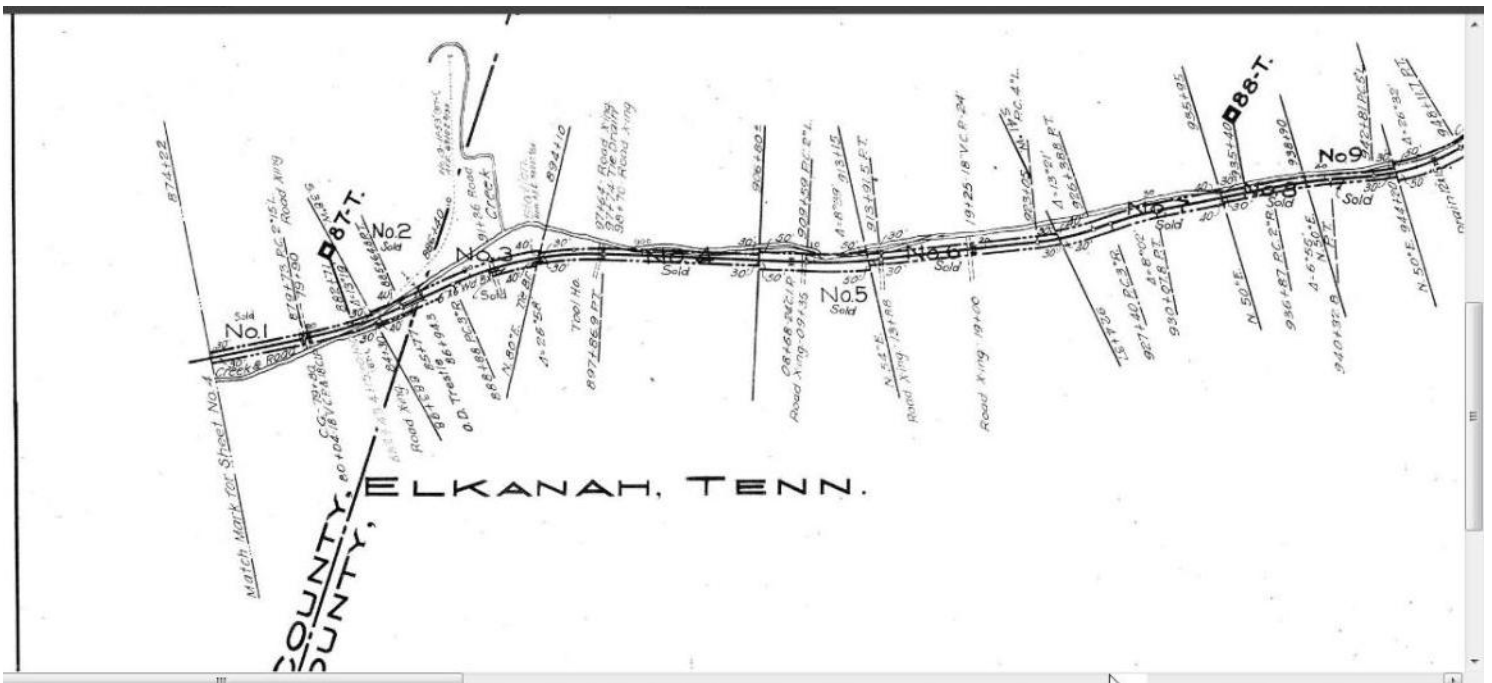
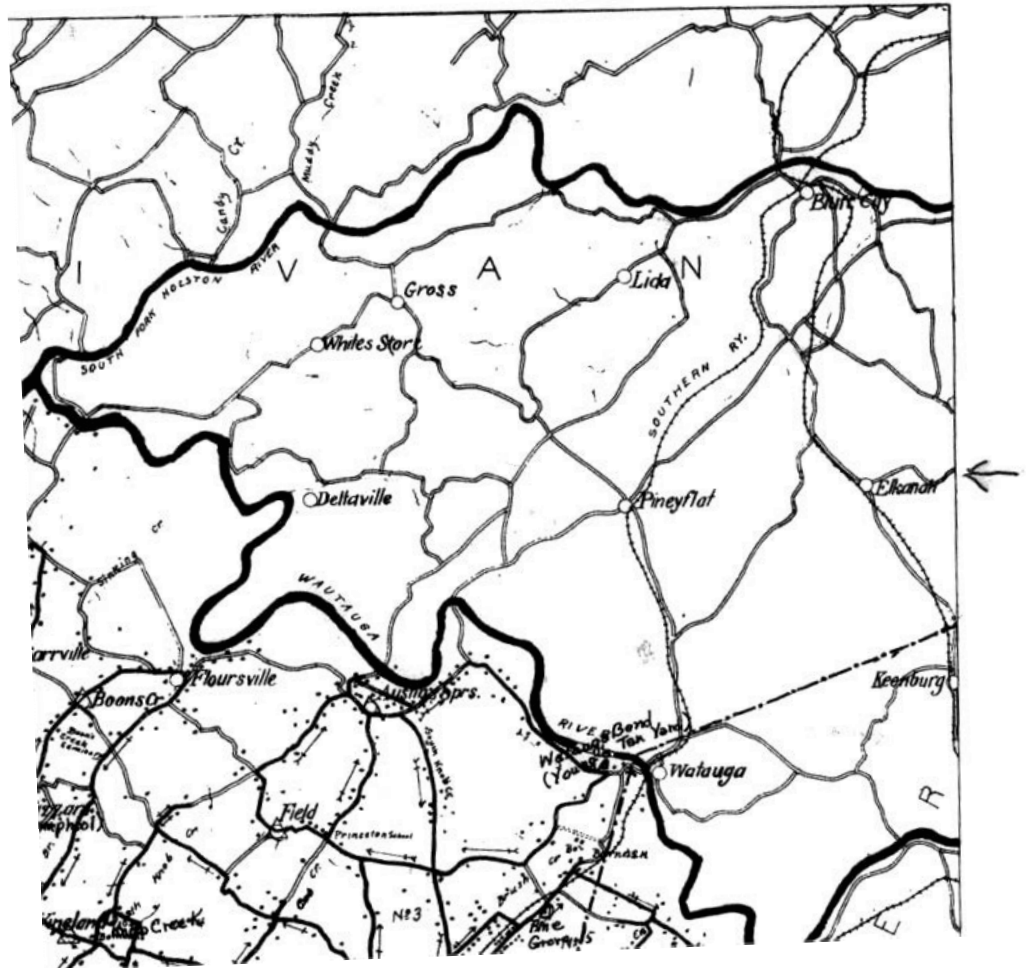
A large part of the Bluff City-Mountain City segment lay in the Watauga River valley, and was susceptible to flooding. On August 13, 1940, such a flood damaged over 13,000 feet of track, four bridges with their approaches, and other parts of the roadbed structure on the 17-mile section between Elizabethton and Butler. As a consequence, service became reduced to a daily round trip of a freight train between Elizabethton and Bluff City.



Because of the large money outlay required to restore the line, the V&SW and Southern requested permission on September 10, 1940, to abandon the entire 46-mile Bluff City-Mountain City section. It was pointed out that less than one-half of the area was devoted to farm-

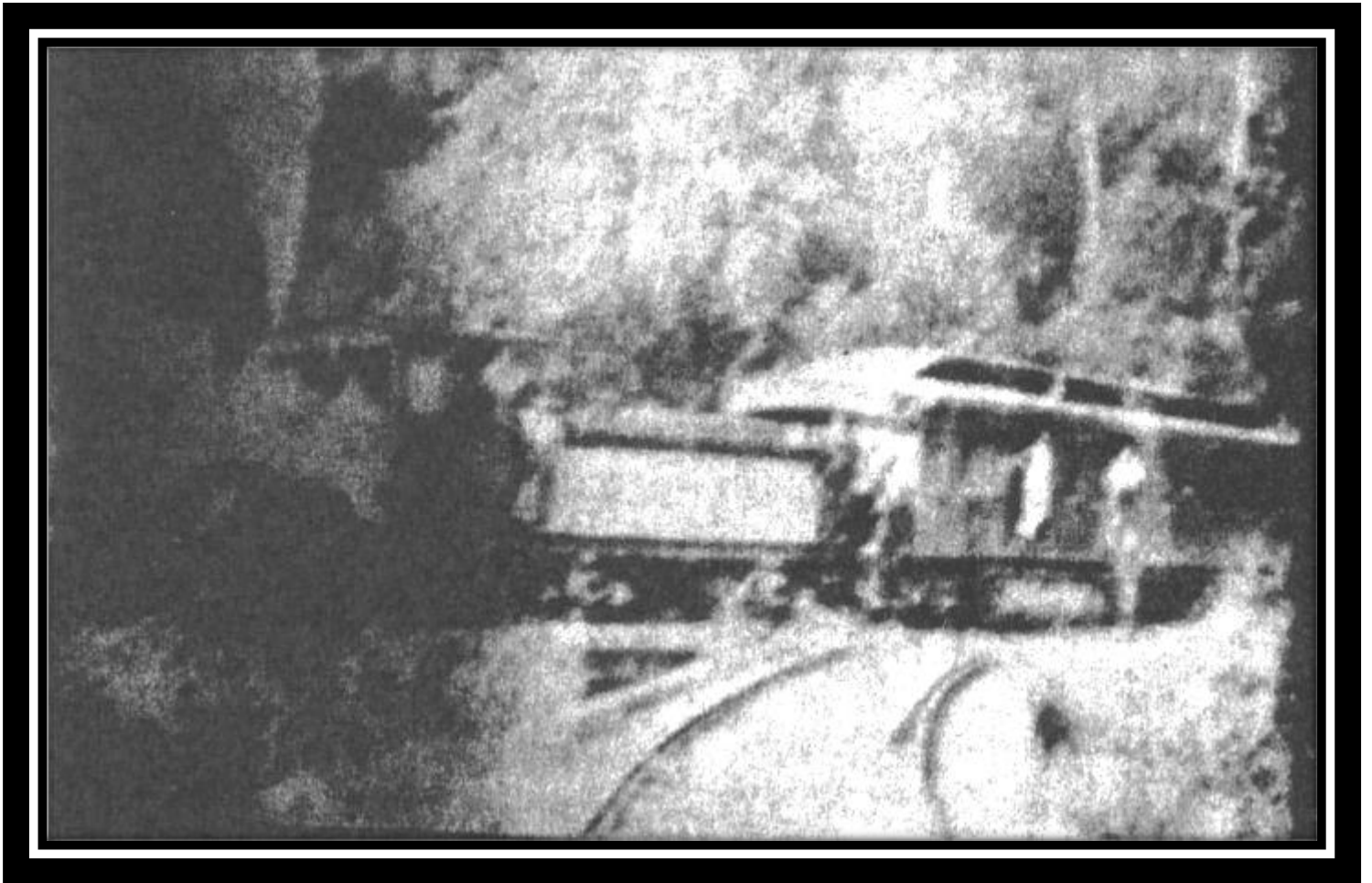
